These aren't Calgon salts or Bath and Body Works Products. "Bath Salts" is the name of a group of synthetic substances with stimulant-like properties.

- These substances have been documented to cause death.
- Traceable through the Air Force's Urinalysis Drug Testing Program
- "Bath Salts" are also known as: Ivory Wave, Vanilla Sky, Pure Ivory, Purple Wave, Charge+, Ocean Burst, and Sextacy





THE USE OF "Bath Salts" IS A VIOLATION OF ARTICLE 92, UCMJ. PER AFI 90-507, para 1.1.7., "...the knowing use of any intoxicating substance, other than the lawful use of alcohol or tobacco products, that is inhaled, injected, consumed, or introduced into the body in any manner to alter mood or function is prohibited."These substances include, but are not limited to, controlled substance analogues (e.g., designer drugs such as "spice" that are not otherwise controlled substances).



In 2009, Sarah Forsyth (Left), age 35, fell into a coma and eventually passed away after using Ivory Wave regularly as a weight loss supplement.

Within months of taking her first hit, Sarah had become a paranoid, aggressive agoraphobic and an insomniac.
